

Please turn and face the cross as the Gospel is read.

Mark 11:1-11

The holy gospel according to Mark, the eleventh chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, [Jesus] sent two of his disciples ²and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. ³If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" ⁴They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, ⁵some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" ⁶They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. ⁷Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. ⁸Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. ⁹Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

¹⁰Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve. This is the Gospel of our Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

The image of the servant of God is one of the notable motifs in the book of Isaiah. Today's reading describes the mission of the servant, whom early Christians associated with Jesus. Like Jesus, the servant does not strike back at his detractors but trusts in God's steadfast love.



¹⁰so that at the name of Jesus



THE PASSION NARRATIVE ACCORDING TO MARK

Narrator: After the Last Supper ... when they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. And Jesus said to them,

Jesus: You will all fall away, for it is written, 'I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be scattered.' But after I am raised up, I will go before you to Galilee.

Narrator: Peter said to him.

Peter: Even though they all fall away, I will not.

Narrator: And Jesus said to him,

Jesus: Truly, I tell you, this very night, before the rooster crows twice, you will deny me three times.

Narrator: But he said emphatically,

Peter: If I must die with you, I will not deny you.

Narrator: And they all said the same. And they went to a place called Gethsemane. And he said to his disciples,

Jesus: Sit here while I pray.

TIME FOR HEALING AND ANOINTING



MEDITATION

Please meditate or pray quietly at your seat while others receive prayers in the front of the church. When all who wish to have prayer and anointing have come forward and then are seated again the service will continue below.

PEACE

Please remain at your seats as we will share the peace as a whole congregation one time. May the peace of Christ be with you always. And also with you.



Narrator: And he took with him Peter and James and John, and began to be greatly distressed and troubled. And he said to them,

Jesus: My soul is very sorrowful, even to death. Remain here and watch.

Narrator: And going a little farther, he fell on the ground and prayed that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him. And he said,

Jesus: Abba, Father, all things are possible for you. Remove this cup from me. Yet not what I will, but what you will.

Narrator: And he came and found them sleeping, and he said to Peter,

Jesus: Simon, are you asleep? Could you not watch one hour? Watch and pray that you may not enter into temptation. The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.

Narrator: And again he went away and prayed, saying the same words. And again he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were very heavy, and they did not know what to answer him. And he came the third time and said to them,

Jesus: Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? It is enough; the hour has come. The Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Rise, let us be going; see, my betrayer is at hand.

Narrator: And immediately, while he was still speaking, Judas came, one of the twelve, and with him a crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests and the scribes and the elders. Now the betrayer had given them a sign, saying,

Judas: The one I will kiss is the man. Seize him and lead him away under guard.

Narrator: And when he came, he went up to him at once and said,

Judas: Rabbi!

Narrator: And he kissed him. And they laid hands on him and seized him. But one of those who stood by drew his sword and struck the servant of the high priest and cut off his ear. And Jesus said to them,

Jesus: Have you come out as against a robber, with swords and clubs to capture me? Day after day I was with you in the temple teaching, and you did not seize me. But let the Scriptures be fulfilled.

Narrator: And they all left him and fled. And a young man followed him, with nothing but a linen cloth about his body. And they seized him, but he left the linen cloth and ran away naked.

And they led Jesus to the high priest. And all the chief priests and the elders and the scribes came together. And Peter had followed him at a distance, right into the courtyard of the high priest. And he was sitting with the guards and warming himself at the fire.

Now the chief priests and the whole Council were seeking testimony against Jesus to put him to death, but they found none. For many bore false witness against him, but their testimony did not agree. And some stood up and bore false witness against him, saying,

Accuser: We heard him say, 'I will destroy this temple that is made with hands, and in three days I will build another, not made with hands."

Narrator: Yet even about this their testimony did not agree. And the high priest stood up in the midst and asked Jesus,

Priest: Have you no answer to make? What is it that these men testify against you?

Narrator: But he remained silent and made no answer. Again the high priest asked him,

Priest: Are you the Christ, the Son of the Blessed?

Narrator: And Jesus said,

Jesus: I am, and you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of Power, and coming with the clouds of heaven.

Narrator: And the high priest tore his garments and said,

Priest: What further witnesses do we need? You have heard his blasphemy. What is your decision?

Narrator: And they all condemned him as deserving death. And some began to spit on him and to cover his face and to strike him, saying to him,

Accuser: Prophesy! (pronounced: PRA-fe-sai)

Narrator: And the guards received him with blows. And as Peter was below in the courtyard, one of the servant girls of the high priest came, and seeing Peter warming himself, she looked at him and said,

Maid: You also were with the Nazarene, Jesus.

Narrator: But he denied it, saying,

Peter: I neither know nor understand what you mean.

Narrator: And he went out into the gateway and the rooster crowed. And the servant girl saw him and began again to say to the bystanders,

Maid: This man is one of them.

Narrator: But again he denied it. And after a little while the bystanders again said to Peter,

Accuser: Certainly you are one of them, for you are a Galilean.

Narrator: But he began to invoke a curse on himself and to swear,

Peter: I do not know this man of whom you speak.

Narrator: And immediately the rooster crowed a second time. And Peter remembered how Jesus had said to him,

Jesus: Before the rooster crows twice, you will deny me three times.

Narrator: And he broke down and wept. And as soon as it was morning, the chief priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes and the whole Council. And they bound Jesus and led him away and delivered him over to Pilate. And Pilate asked him,


Jesus was handed over to the powers of this world. In all nations, instruct the powerful, that they would not exploit their power but maintain justice and peace. We pray that you sustain active soldiers, heal those who are veterans of war, and guide all leaders who command them, that they may all serve those in greatest need of peace and protection. Hear us, O God.

Your mercy is great.

On the cross Jesus joined all who feel forsaken. Abide with those who are condemned to death. Defend those who are falsely accused. Console and strengthen those who are mocked or bullied. Accompany all who suffer with mental illness, physical pain and sickness, or spiritual conflict *especially all those we name now or in our hearts...* grant them all healing, comfort, and renewal. Hear us, O God.

Your mercy is great.

We praise you for the faith you have given to people of all places and times. Give us faith to trust the promises of baptism that we may entrust ourselves and all our prayers to you, O faithful God, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Pilate: Are you the King of the Jews?

Narrator: And he answered him,

Jesus: You have said so.

Narrator: And the chief priests accused him of many things. And Pilate again asked him,

Pilate: Have you no answer to make? See how many charges they bring against you.

Narrator: But Jesus made no further answer, so that Pilate was amazed. Now at the feast he used to release for them one prisoner for whom they asked. And among the rebels in prison, who had committed murder in the insurrection, there was a man called Barabbas. And the crowd came up and began to ask Pilate to do as he usually did for them. And he answered them, saying,

Pilate: Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?

Narrator: For he perceived that it was out of envy that the chief priests had delivered him up. But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release for them Barabbas instead. And Pilate again said to them,

Pilate: Then what shall I do with the man you call the King of the Jews?

Narrator: And they cried out again,

Crowd: Crucify him!

Narrator: And Pilate said to them, Pilate: Why, what evil has he done?

Narrator: But they shouted all the more,

Crowd: Crucify him!

Narrator: So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released for them Barabbas, and Having scourged Jesus, he delivered him to be crucified. And the soldiers led him away inside the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters), and they called Together the whole battalion. And they clothed him in a purple cloak, and twisting together a crown of thorns, they put it on him. And they began to salute him,

Soldier: Hail, King of the Jews!

Narrator: And they were striking his head with a reed and spitting on him and kneeling down in homage to him. And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. And they led him out to crucify him. And they compelled a passerby, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming in from the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to carry his cross. And they brought him to the place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull). And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh, but he did not take it. And they crucified him and divided his garments among them, casting lots for them, to decide what each should take. And it was the third hour when they crucified him. And the inscription of the charge against him read,

Soldier: "The King of the Jews."

Narrator: And with him they crucified two robbers, one on his right and one on his left. And those who passed by derided him, wagging their heads and saying,

Accuser: Aha! You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself, and come down from the cross!

Narrator: So also the chief priests with the scribes mocked him to one another, saying,

Priest: He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the King of Israel, come down now from the cross that we may see and believe.

Narrator: Those who were crucified with him also reviled him. And when the sixth hour had come, there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice,

Jesus: Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?

Narrator: which means,

Jesus: My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

Narrator: And some of the bystanders hearing it said,

Accuser: Behold, he is calling Elijah.

Narrator: And someone ran and filled a sponge with sour wine,

put it on a reed and gave it to him to drink, saying,

Maid: Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down.

Narrator: And Jesus uttered a loud cry and breathed his last. And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. And when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last, he said,

Soldier: Truly this man was the Son of God!

Narrator: There were also women looking on from a distance; among them were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joses, and Salome. These used to follow him and provided for him when he was in Galilee; and there were many other women who had come up with him to Jerusalem.

When evening had come, and since it was the day of Preparation, that is, the day before the sabbath, Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the council, who was also himself waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God, went boldly to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether he had been dead for some time. When he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. Then Joseph bought a linen cloth, and taking down the body, wrapped it in the linen cloth, and laid it in a tomb that had been hewn out of the rock. He then rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses saw where the body was laid.
